Snow Emergency Routes – Ordinance 2024-02

REMINDER 2026



The Township amended its Traffic Ordinance to designate certain streets as snow emergency routes and set forth regulations regarding these routes. The Township is considering the enactment of an ordinance which will designate additional streets as snow emergency routes. Under the Traffic Ordinance, when a street is designated a snow emergency it is unlawful to stand, stop, or park a motor vehicle on the street during the declaration of a snow and ice emergency. Information on the existence of a snow and ice emergency may be given by the Township through radio, newspaper, or other available media. The Traffic Ordinance permits the Township to charge a **fine of \$50.00** to any person who violates the snow emergency restrictions. The Ordinance also permits the Township to tow away any vehicle standing, stopped, or parked on any snow emergency route during a snow emergency, and charge the owner of the vehicle the cost of towing and storage of said vehicle.

2024 was the first time the Township utilized a Towing Company to remove such vehicles. Often, owners who saw the tow truck before it towed their vehicle voluntarily moved their vehicle first. The Towing Company informed the Township that it normally charges a fee of \$150.00 for coming out to tow a vehicle even if it is moved before they tow it to their facility but did not do so last year as it was the first winter the Township had such regulations. The Towing Company has also informed the Township that it intends to charge this fee starting this winter. **Please be aware that, if your vehicle is standing, stopped, or parked in a snow emergency route during a snow emergency, you will be responsible for the \$50.00 fine set forth in the Traffic Ordinance, plus any costs the Township incurs in utilizing the Towing Company if the Towing Company goes out to remove your vehicle, even if the vehicle is moved prior to the towing of the vehicle.**

The following are currently designated as snow emergency routes; proper signage is posted on the roads/streets listed below:

Cory's Court (entire length); Cross Street (entire length); East Fourth Street (entire length); East Second Street (entire length); East Third Street (entire length); Garey Road (entire length); George Street (entire length); Heather Lane (entire length); Hillside Drive (entire length); Ivy Lane (entire length); Jeffrey Place (entire length); Joni Circle (entire length); King Street (entire length); Lanie Drive (entire length); Linden Street (entire length); Magnolia Drive (entire length); Maple Spring Drive (entire length); Maple Terrace (entire length); Mt. Airy Street (entire length); Queen Street (entire length); Sunset Drive (entire length); Union Street (entire length); Wahl Street (entire length); Washington Street (entire length).

The Board of Supervisors enacted Ordinance 2025-03 at their September 18, 2025 meeting to add the following streets as snow emergency routes, proper signage was posted on the roads/streets listed below:

Edison Road (entire length); Furlong Road (entire length); Sovereign Drive (entire length); York Road (entire length)

Animal Rescue League of Berks County/Union Township



Union Township signed a service agreement with the Animal Rescue League of Berks County (ARL) for animal control services in 2026. As part of this initial agreement, the ARL will accept and care for a maximum of 10 stray dogs showing signs of ownership originating from within the township's municipal border.



“The ARL's animal control program offers residents and municipal agencies progressive solutions that provide outcomes and support services in alignment with our lifesaving approach,” said Ashley Mikulsky, ARL's CEO. “We recognize that animal control is not a one size fits all service and are proud to offer the new pilot MOUs to select municipalities that inquire about our services.”

Dogs will be accepted only by authorized township representatives, and no member of the public should bring dogs directly to the ARL.

The agreement will also offer TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) surgeries for residents. To access this service, residents must contact the township manager to receive a code to be redeemed at the shelter.

- Prevents the spread of infectious & contagious diseases
- Reimburses shelters for holding stray dogs
- Reimburses farmers for livestock losses from dogs or coyotes
- Ensures dangerous dogs are tracked and monitored
- Keeps neighbors safer and communities healthier
